Best Western Plus Neepawa completes its pool construction

Neepawa's newest hotel made another splash last weekend, with the opening of its' pool area to customers. The area features the L-shaped indoor pool, as well as a spray fountain, lounge chairs and a hot tub.

The management and shareholders for the Neepawa Best Western Plus celebrated the occasion with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Saturday, Dec. 13. Murray Parrott, who has publicly represented the local shareholders group on the project, served as the emcee for the day. He thanked everyone involved for their commitment to the project, the builders as well as the employees and management for their efforts, during the build. He noted it has

been quite the journey to get to this day, and that the support of the local investors on this project made it possible.

After the ribbon cutting ceremony was completed, Neepawa Best Western Plus General Manager Trish Hall provided the Banner & Press a chance to see the finished space, just before patrons arrived.

Hall noted this addition ensures that Neepawa's Best Western is providing the best possible experience to guests, who are arriving to our community.

The completion of the pool was the primary focus of phase two of Best Western's plans for Neepawa. The first phase involved the opening of the hotel itself to the public back in July.

The exact cost of this portion of the project has not been made public.



Minnedosa Veterinary Clinic receives provincial funding

The Town of Minnedosa and three neighbouring rural municipalities have received provincial funding to support the expansion of veterinary services in the region.

The Government of Manitoba canvassed the Westman and Parkland regions last week, announcing a \$2.6 million provincial investment.

Within the announcement, the government is providing \$671,664 toward a Veterinary Clinic Expansion through a joint application involving the Rural Municipalities of Minto-Odanah, Harrison Park and Clanwilliam-Erickson, along with the Town of Minnedosa.

The funding is delivered through the Manitoba Growth, Renewal and Opportunities for Municipalities (Manitoba GRO) program, which supports infrastructure projects



outside Winnipeg.

The veterinary clinic expansion will strengthen access to essential animal health services for livestock producers, pet owners and rural residents across the region.

In a press release, Municipal and Northern Relations Minister Glen Simard

said these projects reflect the strength of local collaboration and the importance of building sustainable communities.

"This funding will help municipalities deliver the infrastructure families and businesses rely on every day, including veterinary services, recreation facilities, and critical road and bridge upgrades. This is the first Manitoba GRO project funded through a regional co-operation application, allowing multiple municipalities to work together on shared priorities."

Minnedosa Town Councillor and Chair of the

Minnedosa and District Veterinary Board said this funding helps fill a critical need in the area.

"Veterinary care in rural Manitoba is increasingly precarious, with Clinic space, growing demands, workforce pressures and aging facilities, all of which put essential services at risk. This investment directly addresses these challenges by allowing us to expand our clinic and strengthen its long-term viability," he said. "By doing so, we are better able to serve clients, producers, and families across our region, ensuring reliable veterinary care that supports animal health, public health, and the local economy."

2025 marked the first time municipalities were permitted to submit joint applications under the Manitoba GRO program, allowing smaller communities to collaborate on projects with regional impact.

Other projects included \$1,262,314 for the Grandview Community Sustainability Initiative, \$225,000 for the Swan River Legion Park Revitalization, \$438,000 for a road and bridge rehabilitation project, and \$59,150 for the RM of Mountain to conduct Oliniyk Bridge Repairs.



OUT OF HELEN'S KITCHEN With the holidays soon upon us

With the holidays soon upon us, the kids will be at home for two weeks. Get those little hands busy in the kitchen to help make these recipes for the special people (and dogs) in your lives.

Many writers and poets have referred to the New Year as a chance to begin anew, to hope for a brighter future, and indefinite possibilities. I want to extend my warmest wishes to you and your loved ones. May this year be blessed with love, laughter, peace and good health.

Cheeseburger soup

This cheeseburger soup takes everything you love about cheese burgers and transforms it into a cheesy and creamy soup. Your whole family will love it.

1 lb. hamburger
4 cups beef broth
1 medium onion, chopped
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
2 celery stalks, sliced
2 medium carrots, sliced
4 medium sized potatoes, cubed
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. prepared mustard

2 tsp. dried parsley flakes
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup flour
2 cups milk, preferably whole milk
2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

Garnish:

2 green onions, thinly sliced bacon bits dill pickles, diced

Cook hamburger stirring frequently, until the meat is brown and crumbly, five to seven minutes. Drain of any excess fat and put into a large pot. Add the beef broth, onion, garlic and celery and cook for five minutes. Add the carrots, potatoes, salt, pepper, mustard and parsley flakes to the pot and bring to a boil. Turn the heat down and simmer until the potatoes start to become tender, 10 to 12 minutes. Meanwhile in a small frying pan add the butter and the flour. Cook for three to five minutes until bubbly. Slowly add the milk to the flour stirring all the time. When this thickens slowly add to the pot of soup stirring all the while. Simmer for a few minutes more. Remove from the heat, add the grated cheese, stir gently and serve. Garnish with desired toppings.

Candy cane cheese cake

Base:

1 1/2 cup chocolate cookie or chocolate chip cookie crumbs 1/4 cup sugar 1/4 cup melted butter

Topping:

1 package cream cheese, room temperature 1 can sweetened condensed milk 1/2 cup crushed peppermint candy canes 1/2 tsp. peppermint extract 1 -1 litre Cool Whip, thawed

Combine the base ingredients. Reserve 1/4 cup for topping and press remaining crumbs into a 9x9" pan. Put in the freezer while you make the topping. Mix the cream cheese together with the sweetened condensed milk. Reserve 1 tablespoon of the crushed candy for the garnish. Add the remaining candy and the peppermint extract to the cream cheese. Fold in the Cool Whip. Spread over base. Garnish with remaining candy and crumbs. Cover with plastic wrap and freeze until ready to use. Do not thaw before serving.

Peanut butter and banana dog biscuits

Everyone loves cookies but dogs may be the most appreciative recipients of all! For your dog's stocking get your kids to help make these yummy biscuits as they can help stir, roll and cut them out. I have a cutter that is shaped like a dog biscuit but you could use another shape or cut strips out with a knife.

1 cup smooth peanut butter 1 ripe banana, mashed 1 Tbsp. bacon grease or oil 2 cups whole wheat flour 1/2 cup water (if needed)

Preheat oven to 350° F (175°C). Mix peanut butter, mashed banana and bacon grease in a bowl. Gradually add whole wheat flour, mixing until a dough forms. Add water if needed. Roll out dough to 1/4 inch thickness and cut into shapes. Place two inches apart on an ungreased baking sheet and bake for 25-30 minutes until bottoms are lightly browned. Tops may crack but that is okay. Let cool on wire racks completely before storing in an airtight container.

Is Neepawa making space for its youth?

quiet shift is reshaping our town. 15 years ago the average age of Neepawa was 8 years older, for the first time as of last census there was more people in Neepawa under the age of 45 than above.

The Town of Neepawa, used to be called a "retirement town," gaining residents seeking affordability and calm. This is now being countered, by an even more powerful, demographic force: international immigration, which has dramatically transformed the community. Nearly half of Neepawa's population of over 5,700 now identifies as Filipino, a near doubling since 2016. This growth is largely driven by the HyLife Foods porkprocessing plant, which actively recruits a multitude of workers annually.

This trend brings to mind a famous 1960s experiment: John Calhoun's "Mouse Utopia." He placed mice in an enclosed space with unlimited food and water, free from predators or disease. The only limit was physical space.

At first, the colony thrived. But as density increased, society broke down. Mice abandoned social roles; mothers neglected young; some males became hyper-aggressive, others totally withdrawn "beautiful ones" who only ate, slept, and groomed. Despite plentiful resources, stress from overcrowding led to what Calhoun called a "behavioral sink." The population collapsed and never recovered.

What does this have to do with retirees moving to the country, a wave of new international residents, and young people already here?

The experiment was less about mice and more about the effects of unsustainable density, not just of bodies, but of pressures. Today's youth may not live in physically crowded pens, but many face a different squeeze:

•Competition in a Shifting Economy: While major employers like HyLife provide jobs, are there



diverse, long-term career paths for youth beyond a single industry? Is there support for young entrepreneurs or professionals in different fields?

•Social Space in a Changing Town: As the population grows and changes, are there enough inclusive third spaces? Affordable housing? community centers and recreational programs? Where can our young people connect, lead, and build a sense of belonging?

•Navigating Rapid Change: The town's rapid demographic shift is a testament to its economic pull, but it also creates growing pains in housing and services. Are young people equipped with the skills and support to thrive amidst this change?

Retirees seek physical space and peace. Newcomers seek economic opportunity and stability. Young people seek economic and social space, room to build a life, not just find a job. The lesson from Calhoun's mice isn't that we're doomed, but that environmental design matters.

So, what is Neepawa providing? The foundations are being laid:

• Economic Supports: Annual job fairs connect seekers with employers. The Manitoba Youth Job Centre offers free career help for those 13-29. Events like the "What's the Big Idea" workshop encourage entrepreneurship.

•Skills & Education: Assiniboine College offers


local medical training. Workshops on pathways to homeownership provide financial literacy. We also have the ECE Program.

Yet, the critical question remains: are these supports designed to help young people not just live in Neepawa, but to build and lead here? Are we co-designing a community with them, or just making room for them in a structure built for other demographics?

Beyond beer league sports, what other spaces does Neepawa have for young people? Building something meaningful

ABC Therapy Services co-owners reflect on recent expansion, share future plans

Last week's paper featured the grand opening of the new location for A Better Connection (ABC) Therapy Services. This week, the Neepawa Banner & Press had the opportunity to speak with co-owners Shelby Gillies (Speech Language Pathologist) and Martina Villa (Behaviour Consultant) on the growth of their business and services thus far.

Rapid growth

The therapy service first got its start in Neepawa on Sept. 17, 2024 as ABC with Shelby Gillies, with Gillies as the sole owner and services provider. At that time, the business was located in the east wing of the Breaker 16 Building, just outside of town. Then, in June of 2025, Gillies and Villa's collaborations began.

"We had been talking on the phone for quite a while, shaping ideas and planning what our collaboration could look like. Things became more official and structured in August 2025, which is when we began actively searching for the perfect clinic space and moved forward with the planning process," said Villa.

This partnership marked the official change to 'ABC Therapy Services', and their subsequent relocation to 41 Main Street East.

"When we expanded into 'A Better Connection Therapy Services', finding a space right in town felt natural and practical. Neepawa is growing quickly and has become a central hub for surrounding communities," said Gillies. "The location helps reduce long driving times for families and makes services more accessible for people in the nearby areas. It felt like the right place to build something that supports both local families and those commuting from nearby towns."

Stepping into their new space for the first time, and holding their first therapy session, on Nov. 21, 2025 was described by the pair as 'surreal'.

"Seeing our vision become real feels incredibly accomplishing. We put so much work into every step of this process, and being inside the finished clinic reminds us why we did it. The space holds a lot of significance because it represents growth for the community," Gillies enthused.

Villa added, "It creates more therapy opportunities for individuals and families in and around Neepawa, which was one of our biggest goals. It also reflects our resilience and commitment as young business owners. Seeing the clinic open and running shows us, and hopefully others, that when you want something and you put in consistent work, you can build something meaningful."

A major milestone

In addition to their recent move, the co-owners shared that the past six months since their partnership have been full of momentum. With an abundance of encouragement and support from the public, ABC Therapy formed swiftly.

"Families were eager for a clinic that brought Speech Language Therapy and Behaviour Consulting together under one roof. That need pushed our growth forward faster than we expected," said Gillies. "It has been rewarding to watch the partnership evolve from conversations into a functioning clinic that serves individuals and families. It reinforced that there is a genuine need for accessible, high-quality services in this region."

Grateful for support

Looking forward to the coming years, the duo are eager to incorporate a 'sensory gym'. Sensory gyms, also known as sensory rooms, are calming spaces that help individuals manage stress and/or sensory overload. They often include features such as soft lighting, calming sounds and tactile materials and activities.

"It will support our clients during sessions and also act as a drop-in option for families who are travelling long distances and need a safe sensory break," said Gillies. "We want it to be a welcoming and supportive space for anyone who needs it."

The ideas don't stop there, however. Villa expanded further, adding, "We are also planning possible spring break and winter break camps, as well as exploring potential creative and engaging therapy options with other professionals for individuals and families. We also want to create different support groups for individuals and families."

In the meantime, the pair wished to share a word of thanks for the support they have received thus far in their venture.

"We feel grateful for the trust families have already shown us," said Gillies. "Building this clinic has been a major milestone, and we are committed to maintaining a warm environment, high-quality therapy, and strong communication. Our goal is to support individuals and families while continuing to grow with the community."

Neepawa Habitat for Humanity hands over homeowner keys

Just in time for Christmas, Ritchel Quezon and her daughter are settling into their new home, after receiving the keys from Neepawa's Habitat for Humanity. A key ceremony organized for the family was held on Thursday, Dec. 11. It celebrated Quezon's journey to home ownership, as well as recognizing the volunteers, donors, and community partners who made the project possible. The evening also included a tour of the house, which is a 970 square foot home with a basement and two bedrooms.

Neepawa Habitat Steering Committee Chair John Lavich said the community coming together to make this project a reality is what Habitat for Humanity is all about.

"Everyone involved with this build should be proud of what this day represents. [During the build] we had a couple hiccups, but nothing major. Overall this was a fantastic build. We had so many builders come in and help, and volunteers

to no end. It was amazing," stated Lavich.

Built with love and dreams

As for Ritchel, her journey to this moment started a little under four years ago. Since her arrival to Neepawa, the lone caregiver for her teen daughter has worked tirelessly to build up her finances, saving every cent hoping to purchase a place of their own.

Then earlier this year, an opportunity presented itself, in the form of Habitat for Humanity. Quezon learned of the organization, and decided to submit an application. After an extensive process, was chosen as Neepawa's first Habitat partner. Now, all these months later, Ritchel thanked everyone involved for their support.

"Welcome everyone to our new home. We are incredibly happy to have you all here today to celebrate this chapter with us," said Quezon. "A house is made of walls and beams, but a home is built with love and dreams. It's your prayers and your presence and your help that makes this house a

home. We feel so blessed and so grateful. Thank you."

A dream realized

The mandate for Habitat for Humanity is to partner with a selected family, build a house to suit their particular needs and sell to them at the fair market value. While there is no

down payment required, a monthly mortgage is paid and is always 27 per cent of the families gross income. While the homeowners are paying the mortgage to Habitat, as opposed to a financial institution, they are still buying that home, just like everyone else.

There are also other requirements for a family to partner with Habitat for Humanity, including putting in 500 hours of what is known as 'sweat equity'. That doesn't necessarily mean hammer to nail, though that is acceptable. It's about volunteering those 500 hours towards improving their community in some capacity. Ritchel is close to having her 500 hours completed and should reach that benchmark by the end of the year.

In a conversation with the Banner & Press, Ritchel couldn't help but feel emotional about what this day represented.

"It feels like I'm dreaming," said Quezon. "We're going to start moving in [on Dec. 12]. We are so happy. Everyone was so helpful. We can't thank them enough, especially Jon [Lavich]. He's my

father...My father building a house for us."

The Neepawa chapter of Habitat for Humanity was established in 2024. This build is the first for the group, with the groundbreaking happening back in May. There is not an exact timeline for the next build to begin. Those details will likely be announced in 2026.


Farmers blanked at home by Hartney



The Liberals' Bill C-9 seeks to broaden criminalization of words and emotions. Bill C-9 is titled, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (hate propaganda, hate crime and access to religious or cultural places).

The Preamble to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms states: "Whereas Canada is founded upon principles that recognize the supremacy of God and the rule of law". We're not a theocracy, but this great country was built upon a fi mfoundation and Bill C-9 is seen by many as undermining that foundation.

While Conservatives protest Bill C-9, is that enough? Well, many MPs say they have heard from constituents.

Here's the scoop from the National Post: "Opposition Conservatives say a deal between the governing Liberals and the Bloc Québécois to remove a religious exemption from Canada's hate-speech laws, in exchange for passing a bill targeting hate and terror symbols, is an "assault" on freedom of speech and religion."

In a social media video post, The Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner, PC, MP for Calgary Nose Hill said of the amendments to Bill C-9, "It removes the Attorney General's consent so that police can charge you directly," she said. "And it opens the door ... frankly my concern is, it opens the door for politically motivated arrests."

In response to questions from the Empire-Advance, Dan Mazier, MP for Dauphin—Swan River—Neepawa confi med that the amendments to C-9 were introduced on Dec. 2.

Mazier said, "I am very concerned with Bill C-9. I view it as an attack on religious freedoms."

He pointed to an op-ed in the National Post by Andrew Lawton: "Liberals wage unnecessary war on religious freedom with Bill C-9" —National Post. As horrifying as the recent mass shooting in Australia is, the subtitle of Lawton's writing tells that Canadian law already has teeth: "Genocide advocacy is already criminalized but not enforced".

Mazier goes on to say, "Since the introduction of these amendments, Conservatives have pushed back on Bill C-9 at Justice committee. However, the Liberal Chair of the Justice

Committee cancelled their Dec. 4 meeting, which is very concerning, as it meant that we could not debate these amendments...I've received emails from concerned Canadians who want to know their religious freedoms will be protected, and this is no time to delay."

M.P. Dan Mazier says Canadians

should be very concerned

According to the House of Commons website: Meeting No. 14 of the Standing Committee on Justice and Human Rights (rescheduled for Dec. 9) is suspended and will resume at a later date.

Mazier added, "Right now, Canada's existing laws on hate speech are clear that individuals cannot be prosecuted for expressing, "in good faith," an argument or opinion about a religious subject or a belief based on a religious text. The Supreme Court recognized this defence as necessary to keeping Canada's hate speech laws constitutional.

"Another safeguard currently in place is the requirement that the Attorney General consent to proceedings for hate-propaganda off nces.

Mazier referred to the Liberal Chair of the House of Commons Justice Committee, Marc Miller's comments where he said, "there was 'clear hatred' in some books of the Bible."

Mazier said, "All Canadians should be very concerned about this bill, especially with the new amendments, which will not protect people of faith but will instead open them to criminal prosecution for something as simple as quoting their own sacred texts."

"We do not have a timeline for how quickly this bill could pass into law," Mazier said. It will undergo further study at the Justice Committee.


Ted Falk, MP for Provencher spoke in Parliament against the bill and expressed concern for freedom of religion. Liberal Parliamentary Secretary Leslie Church responded saying the defini ion of hate speech is "communicating statements in a public place and inciting hatred against any identifiable group where such an incitement is likely to lead to a breach of the peace."

Note the term, 'likely'.

She goes on to say, "Those who spread hate need to be accountable for it and law enforcement needs the tools to police it."

Found at the link, "JUST - Home - House of Commons of Canada" Bruce Pardy (Professor of Law, Queen's University), spoke saying, "The government seeks to criminalize an emotion: 'hatred means the emotion that involves detestation or vilific tion and that is stronger than disdain or dislike'. It is criminal to detest but legal to dislike, but to detest, of course, means to intensely dislike—that's the meaning of the word—so it will be legal to dislike but criminal to intensely dislike."

He asks, "Where is the line between dislike and intensely dislike? Of course, nobody knows that. The line will be drawn wherever the authorities want it to be drawn to punish speech that the government hates."

Apple meets cheesecake. Crisp apples and tangy cream cheese are the perfect match.

Apple cream cheese dessert

Base:

1 cup flour 1 cup oatmeal 1/3 cup brown sugar 3 Tbsp. cold water

Topping:

2/3 cup flour 2/3 cup white sugar 1/3 cup butter 2/3 cup slivered almonds

Filling:

1 250-g cream cheese 1/3 cup white sugar 1 egg 1 tsp. almond extract 1/4 tsp. salt 6-7 cups peeled apple slices, thinly cut 1/3 cup white sugar 2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 2 Tbsp. cornstarch 1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 350°F. Base: Add the flour, oatmeal and sugar. Cut in the butter until coarse crumbs. Add the water in and mix just enough to make a ball. Press down in the bottom and 1/2"up the sides of a lightly greased 9x13"cake pan. Bake for about 15 minutes, until a light golden. Filling: While base is cooking beat the cream cheese, sugar, egg, almond extract and salt together until cream cheese is smooth. Spread over

the crust. In another bowl add the apples, sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, cornstarch and lemon juice together. Spread over the cream cheese mixture. Topping: In a bowl combine the flour, sugar, then cut in the butter. When crumbly add the almonds and sprinkle over the apples. Bake for 45 to 55 minutes or until topping is golden and apples are cooked. Cool and store in the fridge until ready to use.



Raisin cinnamon swirl bread

3/4 cup warm water
1 Tbsp. sugar
1 1/2 Tbsp. active dry yeast
1 3/4 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
2 eggs


1 1/2 tsp. salt 2 Tbsp. sugar 2 cups raisins 1/2 cup sugar 1 Tbsp. cinnamon

1/4 cup melted butter

Cover raisins in boiling water and let soak to plump them. In a small bowl put the first three ingredients, stir and set aside in a warm place. In a small pan heat milk and butter just until butter melts. Add the eggs,salt and sugar and mix. Add the yeast mix and milk mix into electric mixer with dough hooks and beat in flour one cup at a time until soft dough forms. Beat 7-8 minutes. Add the drained raisins. Turn out onto floured surface and knead into a ball. Turn into a greased bowl. Turn dough to grease top, cover with a clean tea towel and let rise until double in bulk about one hour. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Divide dough into three balls. Roll each ball out into an 8x12" triangle, brush lightly with melted butter and sprinkle on 1/3 of the cinnamon mix. Beginning at 8" end, roll up as for jelly roll. Seal ends of loaf and place into lightly greased loaf

pans. Cover and let rise about 1 hour. Bake in a preheated 350°F oven for 30-35 minutes or until bread is browned and sounds hollow when tapped. Remove from pans and let cool on racks. Enjoy.
















Ukrainian Christmas festivities begin on Christmas Eve. Sviata Vecheria (Holy Supper) brings the family together to partake in special foods and many meaningful customs and traditions.

There are twelve meatless dishes symbolizing the twelve Apostles who shared the Last Supper with Jesus Christ. The dishes are prepared with vegetable oil, omitting all animal fat and milk products, because Ukrainian Christmas is preceded by a period of fasting. When the children of the home see the first star in the night sky it is time to begin the Sviata Vecheria.

Cabbage rolls (holubtsi), which literally means "little pigeons," are served at this special supper. My favorite holubtsi are buckwheat.

This recipe uses oil but I always use butter. Enjoy.

Buckwheat cabbage rolls

2 cups buckwheat 4 cups water salt and pepper to taste 1 medium onion, finely diced 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil 1 large head green cabbage 1 onion, finely diced 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil

I toast my raw buckwheat, for a nice nutty taste. To toast: place buckwheat in dry frying pan over medium heat, stir until lightly browned, about five minutes. Put the buckwheat in the water and bring to a boil. Cook for about 15-20 minutes. While the buckwheat is cooking, fry the onion in the oil. When the buckwheat is cooked mix the onions, salt and pepper in. Set the pot of buckwheat aside.

Core the cabbage and place in a large pot of boiling water. Cover and let cook. Remove the leaves as they become soft. Cool and drain the leaves and remove any remaining core. Cut the larger leaves into smaller pieces depending on the size of the leaf. While cabbage is cooking, sauté the other onion, garlic and oil. Put a tablespoon full of buckwheat filling into each leaf and roll it up tucking in the edges of the leaves as you roll. Grease a casserole dish and place a few leaves of cabbage to line it. Place the rolls in layers. Between the layers add some of the sautéed onion and garlic. Place some cabbage leaves over rolls to prevent the top from drying. Pour warm water over all until it reaches 2/3 up the layers. Cover with a tight-fitting lid or foil and bake at 325°F for approximately two hours or until cabbage is tender. Sometimes it does take longer as each cabbage cooks different.

It would not be Christmas without sweets and pies. This recipe is truly a delicious dessert. It will win compliments at your special meal and perhaps become a new Christmas tradition. This recipe is for a nine inch purchased pie crust.

Apple cranberry pie


3 large apples
1 1/2 cups fresh cranberries
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 Tbsp. cornstarch
1 tsp. apple pie spice
or 3/4 tsp. cinnamon & 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1 Tbsp. frozen orange juice concentrate
1 tsp. grated orange zest

Topping:

1/3 cup flour
1/3 cup oatmeal
1/3 brown sugar
1/4 cup butter
1/3 cup chopped pecans
or walnuts if desired

Set raisins to plump up in hot water. Slice and peel apples. In a large bowl add the apples, cranberries and raisins (discard the water). Mix the sugar, cornstarch, spice, orange concentrate and zest in a small bowl and gently stir into the apple mix. Place in the pie shell. For the topping ingredients, add the flour, oatmeal and sugar together. Cut in the butter until the mixture is crumbly. If using nuts add them now. Sprinkle over the filling. Bake at 350°F for 50-60 minutes until the top is golden and the filling is bubbly. Enjoy warm or cold.





These homemade biscotti cookies are easy to make and perfect for holiday gifts and cookie trays.

Orange chocolate biscotti

1/2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
3 eggs
1 Tbsp. frozen orange juice concentrate
1 tsp. fresh orange zest
2 1/2 cups flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. each cloves and cinnamon
1/2 cup candied citrus peel
1 cup mini chocolate chips

Chocolate Glaze:
1 cup icing sugar, sifted
2 Tbsp. bakers cocoa
1 tsp. vanilla
1 Tbsp. milk

With a mixer beat the butter, sugar and eggs on medium speed until creamy. Stir in the orange juice concentrate and orange zest. In another bowl mix together the flour, baking powder, salt, cloves and cinnamon. Add the flour mixture to the sugar mix and just stir to combine. Add the candied citrus peel and chocolate chips. With lightly greased hands halve the dough and roll into two 2 by 12 inch logs and place on lightly greased (or use parchment paper) cookie sheet. Bake at 350°F for 25 minutes or until

dry and set. Let cool for 20-40 minutes. It is much easier to slice when cool. On a cutting board with a serrated knife, cut the logs at an angle into 1/2 inch slices. Place slices flat on the baking sheet and return to the oven for 15-25 minutes, or until crisp and lightly browned. Flip the biscotti halfway through. Cool on wire rack. Make the drizzle by mixing the ingredients together and with a spoon drizzle over the biscotti. If the drizzle is too thick to drizzle properly add more milk, or too thin add more icing sugar. Store in air tight container.





Filling:

Whipped cream with fresh fruits of choice or lemon curd or lemon pie filling

Garnish if desired:

shaved chocolate sprinkle of icing sugar fruit glaze

To get more volume, it's necessary to have the egg whites at room temperature before beating them. Preheat the oven to 300°F (150°C). Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper. In a mixer fitted with a whisk attachment, on medium-high speed beat the egg whites until soft peaks form. Add 2/3 of the sugar gradually while continuing to beat. Beat until stiff peaks form. It will be smooth and glossy. To the last of the sugar add the cornstarch and gradually add in. Add the lemon juice. For a large Pavlova spread the egg whites on the parchment paper in a 9-10 inch circle. Use the back of a spoon to create an indentation in the center of the mound. For individual ones make 4-5 inch circles with indentations. Place in the oven. For the large Pavlova bake approximately one hour or until firm to the touch but not browned. Turn the oven off, open the door slightly and let the Pavlova cool inside the oven. For the small Pavlova bake approximately 25-35 minutes or until firm to the touch but not browned. Cool in the oven with door slightly ajar. Once the Pavlova is cool, you can serve right away, or store it in a tightly covered container at room temperature for up to two days, or freeze in an air tight container until ready to use. When ready to use fill the shells with whipped cream and top with the desired fruits. Garnish if desired.

Advent calendars are a common sight in many households each December, and some historians believe this unique tradition can be traced to a creative nineteenth century German housewife. Though Britannica notes the precise origins of Advent calendars are still debated, one theory behind the popular tradition suggests a woman in Munich created the Advent calendar as a way for her young and impatient yet excited son

to count down the days to December 25. Though details are fuzzy and difficult if not impossible to confirm, this legends suggests the



crafty German mother filled 24 different small boxes with a baked treat, allowing her son to open one each day during Advent, the nearly monthlong period of preparation for Christmas that begins on the fourth Sunday before the holiday and ends by Christmas Eve. While this origin story connects Advent calendars with Christianity, and many Christians still make it part of their Christmas celebrations, many modern people with no such affiliation also incorporate the calendars into their holiday season routines.











